AIMS & OBJECTIVES

Course aim:

Explore and celebrate children's stories and develop your own writing for children. Through shared reading and discussion, you will investigate different genres of writing for children, and use these as a basis to develop your own writing for children. You will learn about idea generation, how to create believable characters, how to build a fictional world and how to plot a story. You will investigate different writing techniques to develop your own voice and produce a scene or short chapter which will form part of or a starting point for a story for children.

Learning

To successfully complete the course, you will:

Objectives:

- 1. Attend a minimum of 6 sessions.
- 2. Reflect on your own learning.
- 3. Contribute to group discussions about children's stories.
- 4. Identify different genres and age groups within children's literature.
- 5. Generate ideas for children's stories.
- 6. Develop interesting and credible characters suitable for a children's story.
- 7. Build a fictional world for a children's story.
- 8. Craft a skeleton outline for a children's story to demonstrate your understanding of plot development.
- 9. Experiment with writing techniques such as point of view and 'show don't tell'.
- 10. Reflect on your key childhood influences to inform your own unique voice.
- 11. Write a scene or short chapter that will form part of a story for children.



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
